


April 2024 – Analysis/Report to the Board of Directors from Consultant June 2024 – Board review of analysis July 2024 – Begin creation of strategic plan

- Identify ways to maximize organizational revenue




- Confirm our organizational structure best serves our members

SWOT Findings - Strengths



 Members are widespread throughout the region and are invested and committed.



 Highly respected Executive Director at the helm.



 The Connection yields tremendous impact at a low cost. We are a great ROI.



 Projects executed by The Connection produce results.



The Connection boasts
highly impactful signature
projects and activities in its
13-year history.



DEI message is delivered loudly and clearly by The Connection.

SWOT Findings - Weaknesses



 Grantors are wary of operational expenses necessary to a backbone entity and don't offer differentiated funding streams for backbone or systems change work.



 Decentralization of health systems away from the Fox Cities and prior handshake agreements.



 Board of Directors struggles to separate the organization's legacy from its long-time Executive Director.



Significant percent of Executive
 Director time is spent fundraising
 operational dollars vs. mobilizing
 funding for project work.



 Despite doing measurably impactful work for a decade +, the backbone model is still not well understood locally.

SWOT Findings - Opportunities



 The Connection has strong synergy with other initiatives at work in the Fox Cities.



 The Connection is a local thought leader in N.E.W. for successfully managing a backbone and achieving systems change results.



 There is opportunity to expand the footprint of The Connection.



Expanding The Connection's mission to include other focus areas would expand the tent.




 Need for a focus on recruitment, retention, ongoing support for mental health clinicians.





 Developing cohorts within membership can further collaborative impact. The Connection could help to facilitate the conversation among stakeholders interested in a mental health stabilization facility.


SWOT Findings - Threats



 The Connection directly competes with non-profit member organizations for funds and its current model does not allow for revenue creation.



 Big P policy and advocacy work has less of a presence in The Connection.



 Few regional backbone entities have been successful while following the "true" model.



 Future model discussions of The Connection should maintain an independent agenda.





OPTION 1.
Remain leaders in this evolving space.



Option 1: Remain leaders in this evolving narrative

Our strategic outcome: Over the next three years, we continue to educate on the effectiveness of the backbone model to gain greater buy-in from funders. We accomplish this through three action areas which occur concurrently:







Grow revenue
through focused
conversations with
existing major
funders around
differentiated
funding streams.

Grow revenue by growing our membership base (explore dues and footprint).

Grow revenue through focused conversations with potential funders with an interest in creating a backbone of backbones

Differentiated funding streams are showing up and being developed to highlight systems change and backbone work!



OPTION 2. We pivot to a new model

Option 2 Pivot to a New Model

Our strategic outcome: Over the next three years, we explore other funding options. We realize that while we have great impact, the backbone is not fully understood locally.

We accomplish this through one of two new models.










We are being sought out to share our technical expertise and thought leadership




New Model #1:

We generate our own revenue differently.

New Model #2:

We cut overhead needs through absorption.



Turns out we were ahead of the curve with our backbone role... Don't jump ship now – the Fox Valley is just catching up!

Do we pursue multiple strategies at once? But from a place of *stability* rather than *crisis*.



Look at engagement of
Community Health and

Explore strategic relationships for eventual home for backbone of backbone entities (housing, early childhood, wellbeing, mental health, etc.)



Continue ensuring there are differentiated funding options for work like ours – backbones, systems change work, collective impact work



Request to add in backbone support to project grant requests



The path forward is a blended version of all the solutions... and an influx of funding will allow us to capitalize on this blended strategy

Every single grant we wrote for in 2024 was funded!



What's next for projects?



- Building a body of knowledge for the community on how to move the needle on social connectedness, isolation and loneliness at the population level
- Addressing mental health workforce challenges, including recruitment, retention, worker wellbeing, cultural competency, professional development, trainees, diversifying service providers, policy issues
- Creating infrastructure for mental health-focused Community Health Workers, offering psychosocial supports in communities with mental health disparities
- Big P policy work through MHAP (Mental Health Action Partnership)
- Continuous quality improvement of MyConnectionNEW.org, including BIPOC and LGBTQ Mental Health-focused pages
- Project Zero continuation (2024-2026)
- DRIVE Health Project continuation (2024-2025)

DRIVE Health Project Update

- Project Coordinator, Tiffany Yang, went on a leave of absence and did not return to the position
- Working with Blue Door Consulting to contract for an Assistant Project Coordinator at half time for 18 months to support the grant administration through the end of the project
- Completed Community Readiness Assessment Interviews in Black & Hmong Communities – Data analysis reports are currently being prepared by MCW academic partner
- We are part of building the case for the State of Wisconsin to view violence as a public health issue, giving violence prevention work access to public health tools for solving the problem!
